Feel Féile strong with John West nutrition

Did you know... Processed products contribute nearly 30% of the total salt intake of teenagers, according to the National Teens' Food Survey in a survey undertaken by the Irish Universities Nutrition Alliance (IUNA).

In addition, the latest National Nutrition Survey, also undertaken by IUNA, found a staggering 94% of teenagers (and 66% of adults) are not getting enough Vitamin D.

Tuna is high in natural protein and contains less than 120 calories per-tin. It provides other key nutrients we may be lacking, such as vitamin D. Also, tuna, when canned in water, is low in salt."

Fógraíodh gurb é peileadóir Chiarraí, Seán Ó Sé, a bheadh mar Ambasadóir na Gaeilge ag Cumann Lúthchleas Gael do 2024, ag ócáid i bPáirc an Chrócaigh an mhí seo caite. Tá an Ghaeilge an-tábhachtach do Sheán agus tá sé ag súil go mór leis an ról mar Ambasadóir Gaeilge de chuid an Chumainn.

# GAA Clubs supporting Heritage week 2024

To mark the 140th anniversary of the GAA, the Association is supporting the official National Heritage Week festival which takes place from August 17-25.

The theme this year is 'Connections, Routes and Networks' and celebrates Ireland's cultural, built and national heritage.

In 2018 Hurling and Camogie were granted UNESCO's prestigious Intangible Cultural Heritage status and work has commenced on having Gaelic football and Ladies Gaelic Football also added to this list.

Our great games aside, there are lots of ways that the community strength and the role the Association plays in promoting our heritage can be celebrated as part of National Heritage Week in August.

Here are some simple, sample ideas.

1. OPEN DAY: Have an open day at your clubrooms. Invite members of the community to come and bring along items or objects related to the GAA. This can be everything from hurls to medals to jerseys to autographs. Participants will be invited to tell each other the story of their object. Have the open day aimed at those that are new to the community and/or not regular GAA followers to showcase all the sports of the GAA and its history.

- 2. ORAL HISTORY PROJECT: Invite the ICAN network to come to a club to collect oral history about the club, the parish, important games the parish club participated in and stories from those games. Why not follow the advice of the GAA Generations project and encourage younger members to record the oral history of older members of the club and community to strengthen the bond of identity and connection. - 3. PHOTO EXHIBITION: Invite club members and the community to submit photos from activities in the club and at games and display as part of a photo exhibition.
- 4. HOST A TALK. Invite a local historian to speak on the history of the GAA in your area of your county. The heritage of local clubs, and how the game developed in your area. Why does your club wear those colours? What's the story behind your club name? Where did it play its first matches? Who founded the club?
- 5. SCÓR. Have a Scór concert with a focus on local traditional songs or songs about the GAA club. Include Irish dancing, poetry recitals and novelty acts. <a href="https://www.gaa.ie/thegaa/cultur-agus-gaeilge/scor">https://www.gaa.ie/thegaa/cultur-agus-gaeilge/scor</a>

6. CREATE A CLUB HISTORY AND ARCHIVE.

This can be done as a digital project. Invite members of the club to explore the club history and create a presentation that can be recorded as a video or presented live. Consider the Heritage Council Community Heritage Grant Scheme for this and other ideas. Start a club archive by exploring and bringing together minute books, old documents, plans etc related to the club. Invite old and young members of the club to explore this new archive.

7. PLAY GAMES. Nothing celebrates the GAA more than the playing of games. Poc fada, cic fada, Dads and Lads, Gaelic4Mothers&Others. Social hurling and camogie. Walking indoor football for senior citizens. Wheelchair hurling demo. GAA For All inclusion activities. All of these offer the opportunity to get people out, get people involved and get people active and celebrate the GAA and our cultural heritage.















# DATA BREACH MANAGEMENT: INFORMATION FOR CLUBS

### What is a data breach?

A Data Breach is a breach of security leading to the accidental or unlawful destruction, loss, alteration, unauthorised disclosure of, or access to, personal data.

Its more than just losing personal data & examples include:

- Sending an email containing personal data of another person to the incorrect recipient;
- Sharing personal data processed in the context of GAA activities with someone not entitled to that information;
- Loss or theft of paper files;
- Personal data is made unavailable, for example, when it has been encrypted in a cyberattack;
- Unauthorised alteration or deletion of personal data.

It's important we also record and learn from near miss events (where an actual disclosure of personal data was avoided) and analyse what failed to allow the event to occur.



# What do I need to do?

If a data breach occurs it's important to manage it and prevent further loss and make sure we, the GAA, meet our reporting obligations as outlined in the GDPR.

- As soon as a data breach is identified or suspected (even if you're not sure a data breach has actually occurred) contact the GAA Data Protection Officer ('DPO') by emailing dataprotection@gaa.ie or directly caroline.ferguson@gaa.ie.
- The DPO will ask for as much information as possible about the breach and work with the Club to help manage the breach, protect the personal data subject to the breach and consider what needs to be done to prevent it from happening again.

# Key things to remember:

- It's vitally important that all data breaches are reported to the DPO as soon as possible <u>and no later than</u> 24 hours after identification.
- The longer a data breach goes unreported the harder it can be to address any vulnerabilities and may allow the issue to escalate.
- The GDPR also requires that all data breaches are reported to the Supervisory Authority (in Ireland this
  is the Data Protection Commission) <u>within 72 hours</u> of identification. Where we don't report a data
  breach within 72 hours, we must provide the DPC with an explanation outlining why we did not meet this
  deadline.

# And most importantly:

Working together, the DPO and Club will help ensure we're protecting the personal data and right to privacy of the members, supporters and players who trust us with their data whilst ensuring we meet our regulatory obligations.





# Lawful Processing of Personal Data

## Using personal data the right (& lawful) way

The GAA relies on personal data for several reasons – administrating memberships, purchase of match tickets and registration for camps to name just a few.

The GDPR requires that personal data is processed in a lawful, fair and transparent way. In order to do this, we need to:

- Have a valid ground for processing by assigning one of the lawful basis - such as consent, legal obligation, contract execution, vital/public interest or legitimate interest;
- Handle and process data within the reasonable expectations of the individual. Consider:
- What information about the processing was given at the time of the data being collected;
- From the individual's perspective, what are they providing the data for?
- Where processing is unexpected, can we explain why the processing is justified. An example of this would be to comply with a legal requirement;
- Be clear, open and honest with people from the start about how we will use their personal data.



If a club wishes to process data in an alternative way to the reason it was originally collected, such as to send a newsletter regarding a fundraising event, it must be done lawfully. Contact the GAA DPO who will work with you to ascertain how and if the processing can go ahead.

Remember, your position comes with responsibilities. Where access is granted to personal data in your role within your club, it must be strictly limited to the specific purpose.

Failure to meet the requirements regarding data breach management and lawful processing, exposes the GAA to substantial fines from the DPC, loss of trust and complaints, reputational damage and individuals also have the right to seek compensation for damage caused by the misuse of personal data.

It is, therefore, of utmost importance that the GAA and its employees process personal data in the right way.

- Concussion is a brain injury that can be caused by an impact to a player's head
- or body Over 90% of concussions occur without a loss of consciousness, therefore recognition of other signs and symptoms is crucial

# A SIMPLE TWO-STEP **PROCESS SHOULD BE APPLIED:**

# 1. RECOGNISE -

the signs and symptoms

# 2. REMOVE -

the player from the field of play
