Interview Summary	Five members of the Raharney club in Westmeath talk about their GAA experiences. They recall the founding of the club and their own playing days. There are difficulties in running a hurling club in Westmeath and they talk about their efforts to try and make the club thrive through fundraising and trying to improve their facilities. The members recall famous victories and defeats, competing against local clubs, participating in Féile na nGael and establishing links with clubs overseas. They stress the importance of the Raharney club to the local community and highlight the problems that they face on an ongoing basis, including increased medical costs and trying to motivate players to commit fully to hurling in a county where football is more likely to provide local players with a higher profile.  01:45 (Tommy) Football in Raharney in the early 1950s. Playing Killucan.  02:30 (Seamus) Policy of hurling and camogie only in the local school and reasons for that. Lack of hurleys in the 1950s.  04:10 (Kevin) Role of hurling in the school.  04:30 (Tommy) Team in Graffanstown in the 1930s.  05:40 (Kevin) Hurling becoming more serious in Raharney in the 1950s. Reaching finals. Physical nature of games. Joe Foley, Tommy Reilly playing on the team.

07:55 (Kevin) Winning an intermediate championship with players from Turin. Winning a junior championship and beating Delvin in a county final. Making the senior grade in 1961.

09:20 (Seamus) Schoolchildren playing hurling in the afternoons.

10:10 (Seamus) Rivalry between local teams.

10:40 (Kevin) Playing Castlepollard in the senior championship in 1961. Tommy Ring scoring three penalties. Reaching the county final in 1962 and playing Pearse's. Reaching the 1964 final. Winning the 1967 final. Celebrations afterwards.

13:15 (Tommy) Underage success in the 1980s.

14:25 (Kevin) Young players at school improving all the time and coming through in the 1950s.

25:30 (Nicholas) Less injuries in the past. People involved in manual labour more. Injuring his ankle and telling the surgeon he would cure it himself.
