Interview Summary	Jimmy Christy opens the interview by discussing efforts to revive Gaelic football in Derrynoose, Co. Armagh, in the early 1970s. The game had, he says, previously 'faded away'. Christie's introduction to football comprised, for the most part, of informal games in Kelly's field, though he would have looked up to some well-known local players who would have played with a successful Derrynoose team in the early 1960s. Christie, aged 21, was chosen as club captain in 1973 and he charts the success of the club in that year's junior championship and his subsequent call-up onto the Armagh county team.
	As well as Gaelic football, Christie was a keen hurler. He touches on the tradition of camogie and tells of being brought to play in 7 a side hurling tournaments across Armagh. An underage county player, Christie would play his minor and adult hurling with Keady and Middletown and would also represent the Armagh senior team from 1978 to 1984. Throughout his discussion of his own football and hurling playing days, Christie references key individuals who made a contribution to his own playing career and to the development of the clubs he was a member of. He concludes the interview by contrasting the GAA scene in Derrynoose in 2011 with that of the 1970s and 80s and stresses the need for greater commitment among younger players to ensure a restoration of the club's on-field fortunes.
	00:00:05 Discusses his first involvement in football as a teenager in the late 1960s.  00:01:01 Recalls some of the individuals involved with the Derrynoose GAA at that time – John and Eddie Makem – and the 'urge to get something going' in the 1970s after a short 'dormant' period. He mentions that football had earlier 'faded
	away'.

00:01:46 Refers to the involvement also of Sean Flanagan and efforts to get the club registered by the Armagh county board.

00:02:28 Refers to absence of structured underage football in Derrynoose, save for the primary schools. Recalls informal games of football in Kelly's field - playing 'backs and forwards', for example - and the age profile of those involved.

00:03:45 Mentions Tomas Hughes and his role in the early 1970s as Treasurer and later Manager. Other names are also mentioned.

00:04:10 Refers to the return of individuals who would have been part of the 1963 club team. Mentions looking up to some of the club players in the early 1960s.

00:04:50 Starting in 1973 and getting to junior championship final.

00:05:10 Refers to his appointment, aged 21, as captain in 1973 and the 'euphoria' of winning junior championship.

00:06:00 Developments in the county in the early 1970s and being called up for Armagh team.

00:06:30 Talks about Derrynoose's rivals in the early 1970s: playing first game against The Grange, the novelty of playing matches and travelling in Kevin O'Neill's van.

00:07:30 Mentions rivalry with Forkhill, Middletown, Tullysaran, Belleek.

00:08:10 Discusses his involvement with Armagh county team: the step up from playing junior football; playing his first game against Offaly in a challenge match in Tullamore; the standing of Armagh football in the early 1970s and the dominance of Clan na Gael.

00:10:55 Talks about his introduction to hurling. Refers to camogie in the area in the 1960s, to the role of Jim O'Connor in getting him involved in underage hurling, to travelling to play tournaments, including 7 a sides. Mentions the lack of numbers in comparison to clubs like Keady.

00:12:48 Selected to play Under 16 hurling for Armagh. Recalls playing in Casement Park in 1968 after Down footballers had played.

00:13:50 Refers to the fact he went to play Minor hurling with Keady. Cycling to Keady to play games.

	00:19:30 Talks about the superior athleticism of current crop of players and the need for them to be more committed.
	00:18:20 Reflects on the role played by luck and recalls, once again, the successful Derrynoose team of the mid-1980s. Refers to the role of Jimmy Hughes as manager at that time.
	00:18:09 Mentions Derrynoose's competitiveness and strength of its underage set-up.
	00:17:15 Talks about the pressures on young players, many of whom are dual players.
	00:15:25 Discusses the challenges facing Derrynoose in 2011: contrasts the quality of facilities in 2011 with that in 1970s and considers the lack of success on the playing front since the mid 1980s, when the club had a group of committed players, including six from one family.
	00:14:18 Refers also to his move to Middletown in 1972 to play senior hurling and progressing to play with the county team from 1978 to 1984.
