Interview Summary	Seamus begins by talking about his early days playing with Michael Glaveys GAA and how his and others' disillusionment with that club led them to form Éire Óg GAA. He talks about the initial difficulties with the County Board and with his former club. He goes on to discuss his involvement in administration with the Northwest Board and the County Board and recalls a recent period of financial difficulty for the County Board. He then focuses on his career as a referee. He refers to the responsibilities and stresses of being an official and explains his occasional frustration at the role internal politics plays in the selection of referees and the association in general.

09:20 Recalls his first game as a referee in Elphin. Talks about the nature of the job and the various levels he has refereed. Mentions Seamus Nolan, meeting Paddy Devlin from Omagh.
12:00 Discusses going for delegate to the Connacht Council. Mentions having been Chairman of the Northwest Board. Mentions his daughter.
12:50 Talks about his recent and upcoming fixtures as a referee. Mentions his wife's attitude to the GAA. Discusses the difficulties of refereeing and people's expectations.
15:51 Describes his time with Michael Glavey's GAA. Mentions travelling by bus. Talks about his father. Being involved in the local youth club with Gerry Keane and Bernie Cafferkey. Mentions Pat Doory, James Timothy. Mentions soccer.
17:49 Discusses the problems with Michael Glavey's GAA and people becoming disillusioned. Describes the series of events that led to Éire Óg being formed. Mentions Noel Skehan.
19:54 Recalls a particular incident travelling by car to Boyle to canvass for the new club. Mentions Fr Seán Byrne.
20:45 Talks about the voluntary effort that was put into the club. Tells of an incident involving Patsy Larkin in Croke Park. Mentions Noel Larkin, Bríd Larkin, Gerry Keane. Mentions travelling by train.
22:35 Describes the nature of people he has met through his involvement in administration. Describes other clubs' attitude towards Éire Óg. Mentions Paddy Mulvey. Mentions Shannon Gaels, Pádraig Pearse's, Tulsk, Western Gaels, Kilglass Gaels, St Barrys, and Kilmore.
24:50 Talks about the reaction of the County Board to the new club. Refers to tensions with Michael Glavey's GAA regarding a particular player. Mentions Michael O'Callaghan, Peadar Earley, Pat Doory.
26:11 Discusses the nature of talent. Talks of his own involvement in the club. Recalls being chairman, secretary, PRO, and insurance officer. Mentions Eamon Crawley, John

Gallagher who had played with Loughglynn.
27:11 Talks about the old team that played in Loughglynn. Stresses the importance of history. Mentions Western Gaels GAA, Ballaghaderreen GAA. Mentions Peter Crawley, Pat Doory Sr and Patsy Larkin.
28:28 Describes the involvement of the local parish priest Fr O'Rourke. Mentions Dan O'Rourke. Mentions Tulsk GAA.
29:20 Talks about the involvement of women in the club. Mentions Gabrielle Barrett and Josie Regan.
29:53 Talks about the purchase and development of the club grounds and facilities. Describes how they raised money. Mentions James Creighton, Terry Leydon, Tommie Kenoy, Christy Cooney. Mentions St. Nathy's GAA, Sligo.
32:20 Talks about the demographics of the new club when it was set up. Mentions Michael Glaveys GAA. Mentions the Dohertys. Mentions soccer.
33:45 Discusses the history of football in the area. Mentions Keane's field. Mentions Johnny Lynch, Pat Doory, Fr Duignan, Johnny Lavan, John Gallagher, the Gilligans, the Creightons and John Connolly. Recalls Roscommon winning the Minor All-Ireland in 1956. Mentions emigration.

36:00 Briefly refers to the relationships the GAA builds. Recalls an incident involving his brother. Mentions the Carty's.
37:00 Talks about hurling and rounders in the area. Recalls hearing of games of football being played on the roads. Mentions cars and bicycles.
37:50 Discusses his father's attitude towards the GAA. Refers to the support he received from his family. Mentions farming. Refers to women's role in the association.
39:40 Explains the reasons for picking the club name and colours. Refers to the club's sponsors and fundraising. Mentions Lynch Roofing. Mentions Colman Lynch.
42:00 Recalls becoming involved in the Northwest Board. Talks about his attitude towards administration. Mentions Paddy Mulvey, Peter Kearney, Jim Henry (from St. Michael's), Sean Mangan. Mentions being chairman and

secretary.
45:30 Discusses the responsibilities of the Northwest Board. Recalls a period of financial difficulty for the County Board. Mentions John Murphy, Michael McGuire. Mentions the Garda Cup, the Keenan Cup, the Ahern Cup, the North Junior Championships, Division 4 of the League, the Tansey Cup and the O'Gara Cup.
47:40 Recalls the power of the executive being lessened and the reasons for it. Mentions getting All-Ireland tickets. Mentions the Connacht Council. Mentions Johnny Prenty.
49:14 Talks in more detail about Roscommon's financial trouble. Mentions Frank Dennehy.
51:50 Laments the fact that Roscommon don't have a training ground. Mentions Kilbride, Ballyforan, Hyde Park, Castlebar. Mentions Roscommon Gaels. Talks about different developments going on around Connacht.
54:00 Recalls the early difficulties with Éire Óg GAA, specifically with keeping young players. Mentions Michael Glaveys GAA. Mentions emigration. Refers to drinking culture and education.
56:40 Talks about the influence of the Celtic Tiger on the youth today and the different influences on their lives. Tells of a particular incident involving a young player on the pitch.
59:11 Discusses early successes in the club and the importance of success. Mentions Clann na nGael GAA and Castlerea GAA. Mentions the Junior Championships. Mentions Jim McDonnell. Briefly refers to the introduction of ladies' football. Mentions soccer.
