Interview Summary	00:00:18 Earliest memory of the GAA: riding a bike with a friend from Cooley to Dundalk to partake in a Louth minor trial.
	00:00:45 Mentions lack of family background or interest in the GAA.
	00:00:55 Notes the absence of a school team, but hints that football was played informally.
	00:01:14 Difficulty in getting transport to inter-county games when young. Listening to them on radio.
	00:01:34 Mentions again lack of family interest, but mentioned that mother was 'keen' on football.
	00:01:45 Started off playing football in the Cooley league from 1946 onwards.
	00:02:15 Mentions that one of two players would have played their football 'in the town' where they had jobs.
	00:02:30 Mentions some of the friends he played football with, included a man called 'Woods' who was sitting across from him during the interview. (Laughter at reference to 'the lanky fella over there')
	00:02:50 Refers to his footballing heroes when he was young and playing in the Cooley league (he is assisted in recalling names by a third person sitting in on interview)
	00:03:40 Says he was unaware of the money required to keep a club going at that stage but mentions that football boots were supplied.
	00:04:09 Refers to the difficulty of kicking the old, heavy, brown leather football. (Laughter)
	00:04:15 Refers to seldom attending county matches and tells a story of a long journey to attend a Cooley club match.

	00:04:45 Refers to attendances at club games and the use of bicycles by supporters.
	00:04:50 Mentions some of the priests who played an influential role in the Cooley Kickhams club.
	00:05:20 Discusses some of the big names and local heroes in the Cooley club during this youth. Jamie Thornton, Eddie Boyle, Tommy Clarke and Mick Callaghan.
	00:05:55 Touches on the influence of radio and the arrival of Television.
	00:06:15 Mentions as a highlight of his GAA involvement the winning of the Cooley League and the beating of Greenore in 1950.
	00:06:40 Reference to the playing of National Anthem at games.
	00:06:50 Discusses changes in Gaelic football and is critical of the overemphasis on the hand-pass.
	00:07:00 Comments on the opening of Croke Park.
	00:07:17 His biggest disappointment was the day that the club was defeated by St. Mary's c. 1960 (or 1972). He had to go off injured after getting 'a kick'.
