They discuss slight opposition to this move and the subsequent success of the amalgamation. They talk about ladies football and camogie in the club and fundraising efforts to develop facilities over the years. The men discuss their best memories of being involved in the GAA.

- 06:51 Gerry D talks about his earliest GAA memories his father talking about football in Batterstown in the 1930s.
- 07:50 Talks about the strength of hurling in Batterstown in early years mentions the Smith family.
- 08:30 Mentions Johnny Hand, played football in 1960s in Batterstown. Recalls Johnny taking a penalty in his bare feet against Dunboyne.
- 10:47 Recalls his playing days with Batterstown.
- 11:38 Mentions Tom Staunton's involvement with underage football in the club.
- 12:04 Talks about hurling in Batterstown in the 1960s. Recalls winning a Junior Championship in 1963. Talks about the decline of hurling due to emigration.
- 12:57 Recalls stories of local man "Browner" Flanagan.
- 14:33 Jimmy talks about family involvement in GAA his father played with Roddenstown club. Talks about the different fields they played matches on.
- 16:28 Recalls 7-a-side matches in the parish. Describes attending a 7-a-side match and being knocked out by a ball.
- 17:17 Mentions his father being a selector for the Roddenstown team in the late 50s and early 60s.
- 18:12 Discusses listening to Meath matches on the radio in the 1960s.
- 18:55 Talks about his brother Michael. Notes that he holds a record for playing both a minor and senior match with Meath on the one day in 1959.
- 20:45 Ollie recalls his parents telling stories of the successful period between 1949 and 1954 for Meath football. Recalls going to Croke Park for matches.
- 22:43 Discusses the 7-a-side tournaments.
- 24:02 Gerry talks about the facilities in Batterstown in his early playing days no dressing rooms or showers, changing in ditches.
- 25:52 Recalls his mother forbidding him to play hurling at school in Trim.

- 26:55 Jimmy recalls his early playing days in the 1950s. Talks about boys and girls meeting in family fields to play matches.
- 28:30 Talks about the facilities in the area togging out behind ditches or in cars. Talks about Jack Fitzgerald and his involvement at developing facilities in the area.
- 31:23 Discusses Jack Fitzgerald's role in obtaining grants to develop facilities.
- 32:40 Describes an experience of travelling by car to a match and encountering the parish priest, Fr Kilmartin.
- 35:00 Jimmy talks about the lack of hurling in Kilcloon. Mentions stronger hurling influence in Batterstown and Baconstown.
- 36:23 Gerry D talks about hurling in Batterstown in the early days. Mentions the Smith family. Recalls lack of success at senior level due to small numbers.
- 37:11 The men discuss the amalgamation of Batterstown and Kilcloon in 1995. They recall the former successful amalgamation of the clubs at underage level.
- 39:10 Ollie talks about playing hurling in school in Maynooth. Recalls his involvement on the winning Kildare minor team in 1965.
- 43:17 The men discuss the lead up to the formation of the Blackhall Gaels.
- 44:26 Recall objections to the amalgamation from a minority of the community pride in their own club.
- 46:55 Jimmy mentions Eugene Ferris and his role at developing underage football.
- 48:10 November 1994 meeting called in Kilcloon school to discuss senior amalgamation of Batterstown and Kilcloon.
- 49:20 Mentions Liam Brady, facilitator in the discussions to amalgamate the clubs. Recalls more opposition in Batterstown than in Kilcloon.
- 51:29 Jimmy discusses Batterstown's fear that hurling would cease in the newly formed club. Talks about the success of the amalgamation.
- 53:20 Gerry discusses the opposition to the amalgamation within Batterstown.
- 55:00 Gerry recalls going to a Junior A match before the

amalgamation and having to tog out himself in his late 30s due to small numbers. Talks about the success of the amalgamation.

57:13 Jimmy talks about older people being set in their ways and the younger generation seeing the positives to the amalgamation.

59:04 Discuss the choice of name – Blackhall Gaels and the club colours.

01:02:08 Gerry talks about Tom Nolan, chairman of the juvenile committee and his involvement at development of underage football.

01:02:48 Mentions the Paddy McHugh and Jarlath Carthy cups.

01:04:29 P&L Cup – invited 7 clubs from outside the parish to participate in competition at underage level. Ollie recalls 4 Meath and 4 Kildare teams. Recalls great support and pressure on referees.

01:08:09 Ollie talks about the club newsletter.

01:09:48 Gerry discusses the development of the club and pitch in Batterstown in the 1970s and again in 1998. Discusses the importance of volunteers.

01:14:30 Jimmy talks about the current structure of use of facilities in Blackhall Gaels. Talks about the indoor facilities in Batterstown.

01:15:53 Discusses the recent development of facilities in Kilcloon. Mentions a new gym kitted out with second hand equipment.

01:16:59 The men discuss fundraising in early days and recent times in the club. Mention lotto, American tea parties, boxing nights, golf classics.

01:18:35 Ollie discusses the success of the White Collar Boxing night.

01:20:24 Gerry recalls a fundraising match held in Batterstown against Kilcloon for the opening of the pitch.

01:21:05 Jimmy talks about interest-free loans to raise money for the clubs.

01:23:59 The men talk about the sense of identity that is felt in Blackhall Gaels. Note that some members of the

community found the amalgamation hard.

01:25:19 Jimmy talks about the success of Blackhall Gaels at senior level since the amalgamation. Mentions the strong sponsorship of the team by Tom Bailey. Taking part in the Páidí Ó Sé tournament.

01:27:27 Gerry D talks about Ronnie Delany.

01:28:41 The men discuss celebrations after victories. Jimmy recalls celebrations after winning the Féile in 2003 – bonfires and huge crowds at the homecoming.

01:30:38 The men talk about celebrations after winning the senior championship in 2003. Ollie recalls running onto the pitch after the match ended and not wanting to go home.

01:32:38 Jimmy talks about the senior championship final. He notes that the team were losing by 9 points at half time and went on to win by 4 points.

01:35:57 Songs associated with the club – Gerry D notes that Michael Lillis writes songs.

01:39:19 The men discuss rival football clubs – Dunshaughlin and Dunboyne.

01:42:47 The men discuss rival hurling clubs – Drumree, Kilmessan.

01:43:56 Jimmy talks about Ladies Football and Camogie in the club. Notes that they are fully integrated in the club.

01:45:40 Talks about the formation of ladies football in the club.

01:46:18 Discusses the success of the camogie team. Won county senior championship in 2007.

01:48:29 Describes the fundraising efforts of the ladies within the club.

01:50:26 The men talk about ladies involvement in administration within the club.

01:52:49 Gerry S joins the interview. Describes his earliest GAA memory – playing ground hurling with St Mary's in Leitrim.

01:55:15 Recalls the ban on soccer in the school.

01:55:57 Gerry S recalls becoming involved with Blackhall Gaels. Talks about his administrative roles in the club over
