His family's involvement with the club goes back generations and as a former player, manager and administrator he is proud to continue that association. He talks about the many characters and families who have been involved with the club down through the years, all of whom had a real sense of community spirit. Together they have developed a club that has many aspects to it and well- developed facilities that allow its large membership to feel part of something special. Fingallians have a history that reaches far back and coincided with important events in Irish history, and David also discusses this while sharing stories that have been passed on to him about club members who played a role in shaping the face of a nation.

35:00 Peadar Ó Ceallaigh involved in club reforming and occupying role of secretary. Fundraising dance that was held. GAA not happy. Issue going to court. Split as a result. Some people going to St Colmcille's.
36:20 Holding the Jimmy Magee All Stars once a year. Former Taoiseach Charles Haughey and former Dublin football boss Kevin Heffernan visiting.
37:10 History of the club. Mike Dunne first captain of the club, succeeded by John Dunne, who later went off to war. Frank and Eamon Lawless central figures. Involvement in 'Battle of Ashbourne'. Thomas Ashe a central figure. Frank's descendent on a Dublin team trained by Tommy Lyons that lost a Leinster final to Laois.
39:25 Bobby Savage a former captain of the club. Jack Kelly, Peadar Hughes, Andy Hamill, Peter McEvoy, Jimmy Woods also involved.
41:10 Tommy Taylor, John Taylor, Chris Taylor involved in purchase of club grounds in 1911. Peadar Ceallaigh chairman and secretary of the club.
42:55 Importance of families to the club over the years.
44:25 Swords a rural club in the past. Players travelling to games by horse and cart in 1932.
46:30 Economic hardship crippling the club in the 1950s. Emigration. Similar problems in the 1980s. Troubles fielding teams in 2009.

membership. Offering family deal on membership prices.
