	03:48 Tells of the field being donated by the local priest to the parish for a sports field in the 1930's and of it being invested in the GAA in 2008. Talks of the place held by the GAA club in the community.
	05:33 Speaks of the celebrations when titles were won.
	05:55 Talks of the national school tournaments in Mayo.
	06:46 Tells of the huge role played by teachers and priests in the development of GAA in schools. Mentions Fr. Padraig Costello, Fr. Michael Gallagher and Fr Tommy Towey.
	08:04 Talks of playing football but not being a star of the club.  Mentions beating Ballina.
	09:05 Speaks of the impact of emigration and of people

- moving to Dublin and this impact on the GAA in Mayo. Mentions Portobello GAA Club.
- 10:31 Talks of his time in management both in Mayo and Dublin. Mentions his coaching courses and being one of the first tutors in the area. Also mentions the response from the players and how fulfilling the role was.
- 13:20 Discusses what makes a good manager and a good player.
- 14:58 Speaks of his relationship with the club committee and county officers.
- 15:42 Talks of the day to day routine of the manager and players.
- 17:23 Tells of his successes as a manager over the years. Mentions Liam McHale of Ballina. Also mentions his time managing the Mayo Under 21 team.
- 19:58 Speaks of driving to matches with his father when young. Mentions many walking or cycling to matches.
- 21:15 Talks of travelling to Croke Park and outlines his matchday traditions. Mentions Tarmonbarry and Mother Hubbard's.
- 22:55 Speaks of the fundraising activities over the years. Mentions the cost of running the club. Also mentions the county board draw. Talks of going to Leeds and Manchester with the club and the great social scene.
- 25:45 Describes the weekend in Leeds and the games they played. Mentions the return visit by the Leeds team.
- 27:34 Talks of the role of women within the GAA and how it has developed over the years. Mentions the advent of ladies football. Also mention camogie dropping off because of a lack of numbers.
- 29:35 Speaks of the number of the current team based outside Bonniconlon. Mentions the numbers always being a problem when players moved away to Dublin. Also mentions fitness tests being used.
- 31:56 Talks of the sacrifices he made over the years because of his involvement in the GAA. Mentions never going on holiday during the season.
- 33:53 Speaks of the importance of volunteers to the GAA.

	Mentions not being in favour of pay for play.
	34:52 Talks of the best match he ever watched; Mayo v Dublin. Mentions Sligo and Mickey Moran. Also mentions assisting in the Sligo training.
	36:11 Talks of Anthony Egan as his GAA hero.
	36:59 Speaks of his best memory being winning the county title and the worst memory being Mayo v Kerry and Bonniconlon v Achill.
