Interview Summary	Brian talks about his involvement in the GAA over the years. He talks about playing football in national school before going to St. Macartan's College in Monaghan and playing there also. He discusses playing with the Bundoran club and playing soccer for Sligo Rovers under a different name. He talks about the history of the club and how it has developed over the years. Brian discusses playing with, and the success of, the St Joseph's club, an amalgamation of Bundoran and Ballyshannon. He talks about moving to Canada and getting involved with the GAA there before playing for a Kerry team in New York. Brian talks at length about his playing and managerial career with Donegal, the culmination of which was the winning of the 1992 All-Ireland football final. He describes what that was like and the build-up to the final. He talks about his administrative career and the work involved from club to national level. He gives his opinion on various aspects of the GAA over the years including the issue of professionalism within the Association and also the removing of Rules 27 and 42. Brian describes the role of the GAA in his life and talks about what the Association means to him. 00:00 Introduction 00:27 Brian talks about his earliest memories of the GAA.

played for Tyrone. Playing football in Carrickmore and going to a country school. Mentions Eoin McGuiness and organising school leagues based on street areas. Recalls his father buying him a pair of boots. Going to see Sligo Rovers. Playing in goals first before playing outfield. Mentions Robbie Cullen. Describes the Ballyshannon style of play.
04:35 Recalls going to watch Donegal matches with his father and the players on the team from the 1950s on. Mentions Frank O'Donnell, Frankie Brennan, Jim Gallagher, Jackie McDermott, Peadar McGeehan, Colm Tobin, Hughie Tim Boyle and Sean O'Donnell. Going to school in St. Macartan's College in Monaghan. Talks about his father's Glasgow connections and supporting Glasgow Celtic and continuing to watch Sligo Rovers.
06:39 Talks about listening to Michael O'Hehir on the radio and becoming a Wexford hurling supporter. Mentions the Rackard brothers and Jim Morrissey. Mentions golf and tennis.
07:24 Discusses the role of the GAA in St. Macartan's College. Recalls his interest in soccer and having to make a football because his was confiscated by Fr Enda McCormack. Notes how he played for Sligo Rovers under the name of John Rooney and how he didn't play soccer after the Ban was lifted. Mentions Ardara and Killybegs.
08:40 The amalgamation with Ballyshannon and playing with the St. Joseph's club. Played Ranafast and McRory Cup with St. Macartan's. Mentions his divided loyalty in a match against St. Eunan's.
09:55 Discusses playing illegally with Clanna Gael in Dublin. Mentions St. Vincents, Na Fianna and Sean Ferriter. Played Sigerson Cup for Trinity College (also illegally).
10:40 Playing with Bundoran before moving to Canada and getting involved in the GAA there with the Clann na nGael club. Winning a hurling final in Toronto.
11:39 Talks about coming home in the 1960s and playing with St. Joseph's, an amalgamation of Bundoran and Ballyshannon. Discusses getting picked for Donegal and playing against Longford, Cavan and Down. Beating Crossmaglen to win an Ulster Final having beaten Carrickmore in the semi-final. Recalls his mother divided loyalties.
13:40 Discusses the setting up of the minor board in Donegal

and becoming manager for the Donegal minor team. Mentions John 'the Dodger' McDermott, Martin Carney, Kieran Keeney and PJ McGowan. Recalls being sacked. Talks about being on the Ulster Council at the same time. Getting picked on the Ulster team for the Railway Cup and going to San Francisco with the All-Stars in 1971.
15:43 Talks about buying a hotel during the Troubles. Describes his interest in the GAA and how it became a way of life.
17:55 Discusses being involved with the Donegal team during the 1970s. Getting beaten by Leitrim and approaching Mick Higgins and going for player/manager. Winning the Ulster championship in 1972. Recalls travelling to Cork to see his brother and being recognised by a man on his way to Doneraile. Mentions getting drawn against Tyrone to play the first game in Healy Park, Omagh. Beating Down. Talks about travelling to New York to play with Kerry. Mentions John Kerry O'Donnell and Jim Daly. Returning home and being sacked. Playing under John Hannigan. Discusses retiring from playing with Donegal. Mentions Brendan Dunleavy and Sean O'Donnell.
24:22 Talks about playing and managing Bundoran after St Joseph's broke up in the late 1970s. Discusses getting back involved in the Donegal team in 1980. Match against Tipperary, only team lower was Kilkenny. Mentions Martin McHugh.
26:50 Playing Tipperary in Emly. Recalls Donegal's campaign in 1982. Mentions Frank Rush.
28:05 Talks about winning the Ulster Senior Championship in 1983. Being sacked after 1976. Playing Armagh, mentions Charlie Mulgrew, Eunan McIntyre and Paul McGettigan. Being involved in the Ulster Railway Cup team at the same time. Being sacked for the third time. Tom Conaghan taking over. Becoming Donegal manager again in 1989. Winning the All-Ireland in 1992. Talks about retiring in 1994.
31:55 Discusses his role in administration at national and provincial level and being appointed Ireland manager for the International Rules against Australia in 2000.
32:35 Talks about becoming Donegal county chairman in 2002 and again becoming county manager. Discusses the team's campaign that season. Getting to the All-Ireland semi-final.

41:58 Recalls Donegal's 2004 campaign. Mentions Cormac McAnallen. Talks about the people he worked with. Discusses his work with Ulster Council and Central Council. Talks about his work with Louth in 2010 and going back to the Bundoran club to help out. Describes his interest in anything to do with the GAA.
50:40 Discusses his involvement in the Louth team in 2010. Mentions Sylvester Maguire, Martin McQuillan and Peter Fitzpatrick. Stopping in Newbliss on way over and back. Talks about the people involved and the Leinster final against Meath. Mentions Peter McDonald and Benny Tierney. The problem putting on the Louth tracksuit.
53:05 Recalls going to watch Tyrone play Louth in 1957. Travelling by train with Art McRory. B-Specials entering the train on way back to Carrickmore.
54:26 Talks about working with the Sligo county team.
56:23 Describes the difference between working with Donegal and with other teams.
58:15 Recalls playing soccer with Sligo Rovers under a different name in the 1960s and nearly getting caught by the Vigilance Committee. Playing with Toronto Omagh. Mentions Sean O'Donnell and Patsy McGowan. Trial for Shelbourne against Shamrock Rovers in Dublin and ended up playing with a Church of Ireland team in Sligo called Carrowroe and getting picked for the Sligo-Leitrim AUL team. His father's death.
