Interview Summary	John and Thomas are lifelong members of the Currin Sons of St Patrick club and they talk about their many experiences over the years. Currin is one of the oldest clubs in Monaghan and they are proud of its longevity. Together they recall playing football growing up, a time when the game was physical, facilities basic and footballs thin on the ground. Club tournaments were popular, although underage structures were not very developed. Big inter-county games were listened to on the radio at neighbours' houses, while John got to attend numerous games in Croke Park when he moved to live in Dublin. He later resettled in Monaghan and began a long and varied administrative career at club and county board level.

11:35 (John) First All-Ireland was between Kilkenny and Waterford in 1957. Watched Louth play Cork in the football final a few weeks later. What he thought of Croke Park.

13:25 (John) Currin Club founded in 1886. Inniskeen around for a similar length of time. Successes and failures. Why failure was more common.

16:15 (John) Brian McCabe a long-serving treasurer of the club. Celebrating his involvement.

17:35 (John) Other success the club enjoyed.

18:20 (John) Hurling at the club in years gone by. Why they don't have a ladies football club.

19:30 (John) Parish club is located in. Bishops and priests produced by the parish.

20:55 (John) Attempts by Fermanagh to claim some of the parish land over the years. Some people living in Fermanagh but playing for a Monaghan club. Which county they would support.

22:25 (John) Where the bulk of their players come from.

23:00 (John) Issues over people from Fermanagh townlands playing for the club. Ulster Council ruling on the dispute.

24:45 (John) Full name of club is Currin Son's of St Patrick. Reason for that name. Club colours and where they came

from. Colours evolving over they years.

28:30 (John) Prominence of GAA at schools they attended. Less competitions. Playing at Under-16 level.

29:40 (Thomas) What it was like playing in the fields when they were young.

30:25 (John) Structures becoming more organised over the years.

31:50 (John) Former GAA President Sean McCague opening their ground in 2002. Fr. Pat McHugh driving force behind purchase of the ground. Brian McCabe, Dermot Beattie, Pádraig McCaffrey all involved.
