10:21 (Anne) Tells how she used to hitch lifts to matches. She mentions, Newlands Cross, Tullamore and Portlaoise and describes the atmosphere at these matches.

11:45 (Anne) Discusses rivalry in the GAA and mentions Dublin and Kerry, and Cork and Kerry.
12:14 (Anne) Talks about her views on the changes in the GAA and her father's opinions on it. She talks about violence in the GAA and Australian Rules.
13:29 (Anne) Discusses how her father describes the GAA when he was growing up in inner-city Dublin and his involvement.
14:05 (Anne) Talks about Rule 42 and the Ireland V England Rugby match. She gives her opinion on Croke Park and the allowance of foreign games played within the stadium.
14:55 (Anne) Discusses her impression of the relationship between politics and the GAA and how this link originated. She talks about the international perception of the GAA and her experience of the GAA in the Middle East and Asia.
16:31 (Anne) Talks about the GAA during the Troubles in Northern Ireland and discusses segregation within the GAA in Northern Ireland. Talks about the Irish language and its
