He also gives his opinions on how the GAA has changed during his time, and whether or not this is a good thing.

10:50 Listening to a game between Derry and Dublin in 1958. Fondness he had for Derry and reason for that.

11:15 Joining the P&T and going to Kevin's Street for training. How he got involved in that. Getting special tuition for entrance exam at Ely Place in Dublin in 1960. Interview at office in O'Connell St.

13:00 Starting work in 1962 in Bagenalstown. Duties he had.

13:35 Organising a game against the ESB in Dublin. How that went. Playing in Tallaght.

14:10 Post & Telegraph championships. Playing against Wexford, Portlaoise and Naas.

14:55 Moving around because his job required it. Going to Enniscorthy and Waterford to work. Meeting different characters in lodgings he stayed at.

16:25 Poor quality lodgings in Dublin. Staying near South Circular Road. Listening to Ireland's Top Ten on the radio. Not being happy with the food he received.

17:10 Working in the Kildare Street Club in Dublin, a

gentlemen's club, when he was 15. His impressions of that. Freemasons meeting there. Mrs Alexandra being refused entry. Sir Basil Goulding and his wife Valerie visiting..

20:10 How he got the job there. Where he stayed while working there. Paddy Cusack from Ballyporeen there. Paddy bringing a girl back there.

21:20 Getting involved with St Andrew's GAA club.

22:05 Club success in the 1970s.

22:35 Club founded in 1952. GAA in Bagenalstown since before 1900.

23:00 Junior final in 1930 in Ballinatrain against Carlow Gaels. Charlie Murphy refereeing the game. Player, Johnny Condon, involved in a terrible incident during the game. What happened. HIs own research into the incident.

24:10 Erin's Own hurling club formed in 1934.

24:40 Erin's Own and MONEY BEAG meeting in the championship in 1951 in McGrath Park. Gardaí called due to trouble at the match.

25:00 St Andrew's the football club and Erin's Own the hurling club from 1952 onwards.

25:15 Micheál Jones chairman of St Andrew's when he joined, and Jim Plunkett of Leitrim secretary.

25:45 Issue with a player who was prone to injury. How Jones and Plunkett reacted. Other stories about their relationship.

26:40 Willie O'Connor heavily involved in the GAA in the area, eventually becoming chairman of Carlow County Board. Working with him in the 1980s.
