| Interview Summary | Alo and Noel describe growing up in Offaly with an enthusiasm for GAA. Although they didn't have the best equipment they spent all their time immersed in playing games, as there was little else to do. Martin moved to the area and quickly became involved with the Tullamore club, enjoying some success with the team. Alo played with the county team and was part of the panel that contested the 1961 All-Ireland final. He also managed a number of clubs, spending some time in England in later years. Between them they played, coached and worked hard to bring administrative projects to fruition, such as the centre that the club opened in 1972. The three recall a time when rural life was simpler, the games were less defensive and the Association less structured. And as supporters they recall the unbridled joy that swept the county off its feet in the wake of a succession of unexpected All-Ireland triumphs in both hurling and football over a relatively short space of time. |

18:55 (Noel) Serving a suspension. Why he was punished.

19:40 (Alo) Going to a game in Dalymount Park, Dublin with Kevin Heffernan and Ollie Freeney. Travelling by train. Roly

Brien telling him was suspended. Others not suspended.

21:10 (Noel) Limerick playing a game and hurler Mick Mackey caught at a hurling match. Action that was taken by county board.

22:25 (Noel) Removal of Ban discussed at club meeting. Chairman conducting meeting and how he handled it.

23:55 (Alo) John Clarke in favour of maintaining Ban. How others felt. Reflections on Ban.

24:55 (Noel) Club acquiring land. Decision to build a social centre in 1970s. Centre busy on a Sunday but closed in 1999.

26:55 (Martin) Joe Bracken chairman of club when he arrived in 1970s. Constant talk about a social centre. Being proposed to work on its development.

28:20 (Alo) Plan for centre at O'Connor Park.

29:00 (Alo) Raising money for the centre. Grants and fundraising. 'A pound a block'.

29:55 (Martin) Secretary of county board John Dowling on committee. Gerry Conway, Steve Donovan also involved. Andy Gallagher chairman of club.

32:00 (Martin) Opening of centre in 1972. Facilities there.

34:15 (Noel) Downside of centre. Many volunteers needed.

34:55 (Alo) Economic factors.

35:30 (Noel) Dances held in early days of centre. Beauty contest. Model Yvonne Costello as judge. Argument over winner.

37:15 (Martin) Moving to the area in 1957. Winning a title in 1963.

37:35 (Alo) Split within the club in 1949. Some players going to Durrow. What dispute was about. Effect of that on him as a young player. What became of the players that left for Durrow. Ferbane and Welsh Island successful teams. Ballycumber also competitive.

41:30 (Martin) Social centre blamed by some for lack of success.

42:30 (Alo) Joe Cassidy, Harry Burke in charge of team in late 1950s. Trainers not so important at that time. Prominence

of selectors.

43:25 (Alo) Training they did in the 1950s.

44:30 (Martin) Playing against Edenderry and later in Mullingar. Harry Burke in charge.

45:10 (Alo) What training was like. Serious training did not start until the 1960s. Peter O'Reilly a manager in the 1950s. Giving pills to the team.

47:35 (Alo) Started playing for the county in 1950. Phil O'Reilly, Dickie Conroy, Eamon Fox, Joe McFadden playing in later years. County set-up at the time. Mickey Furlong, Mick Casey, Paddy Casey, Archie McLoughlin, Archie Keenahan, Christy Carroll all good players.

49:00 (Noel) 1954 Offaly team very talented. Mickey Brady, Peter Nolan, Kevin Scally, Paddy Fenlon all playing.

49:20 (Alo) Complications of selector system.

50:00 (Martin) Offaly team in early 1960s very talented. 1960 All-Ireland semi-final against Down.

50:40 (Alo) Refereeing decisions costing Offaly teams of the 1960s.

51:00 (Noel) Offaly inter-county success since then in football and hurling.

51:35 (Alo) Offaly winning a hurling Tailteann Games and the team going to the USA in the early 1940s. Few returning.

52:25 (Alo) Offaly hurling success. Beating teams from every province in All-Ireland hurling finals.

53:05 (Noel) Huge attendance at 1961 All-Ireland final against Down. What that was like.

53:45 (Alo) Being s substitute on that team due to injury. Brought home to play a league game in 1959. Peter Nolan and Paddy Casey in the USA but not brought back for final. Need to mark Down's James McCartan. Possible reason they were not brought back. Conor Vaughan chariman at the time.

56:15 (Noel) Living in Dublin at time of All-Ireland final. Accommodating people night before the match. Dan Fox cooking breakfast in the kitchen.

57:15 (Alo) People cycling to Dublin to watch Offaly playing. His brother doing so.

57:45 (Noel) Joy they got out of Offaly All-Ireland wins. Billy Fitzpatrick a talented Kilkenny hurler.

59:20 (Noel) Ollie Bracken Mickey White, Barney Cromney, Niall O'Dea talented club players in 1970s. Tullamore winning minor, Under-21 and senior titles in one year. What followed that.

01:00:25 (Alo) Membership levels at that time.

01:01:50 (Alo) Tournaments in Mullingar and Athlone. Dicksboro visiting from Kilkenny.

01:02:30 (Martin) Very little happening in villages. 7-a-sides in Edenderry.

01:03:40 (Martin) Being at a dance when Tullamore were playing Edenderry in a 7-a-side. Talk about game and Oliver Byrne. Match called off.

01:04:55 (Alo) Street leagues in Tullamore and popularity of them. Who organised the leagues.

01:06:15 (Noel) Factory league. Williams, Egan's, Salts playing. Billy Dwyer playing for Kilkenny Council against Egan's. How the game went. Jim Fox and Dermot O'Brien going for a drink with him afterwards. Moving on to a dance. John Reynolds a local detective. Meeting him. Consequences.

01:08:10 (Alo) Going for walks after training.

01:08:45 (Alo) People listening to games on the radio. Westmeath-Offaly Independent a local paper. Tribune taking over. Why that was better.

01:09:45 (Alo) Ending his inter-county career in early 1960s. Training Round Towers in London. Training a Leinster Railway Cup team.

01:10:50 (Alo) GAA experiences in London. High levels of physicality. Possible reasons for that. Dermot O'Brien chairman of county board in London. Being asked to train Round Towers.

01:12:50 (Alo) Training Welsh Island, Ferbane, Tullamore, Clogheen in 1970s. Approach to training. 1971 team and what they were like. Fr Gilhooley manager. Martin Furlong a stalwart of the team. Furlong and John Smith dropped by former Offaly manager Eugene McGee. McGee asking Noel if Furlong would return to Offaly. What happened. Mickey and

Tom Furlong also good players.

01:22:05 (Alo) Tour to San Francisco and New York. Touring around Ireland.

01:23:55 (Noel) Problems with closed season. Danger of losing players to rival sports.

01:24:45 (Alo) Change in footballing style over the year. Defensive nature of modern game.

01:26:55 (Noel) Going to Croke Park on St Patrick's Day for the Railway Cup as a child. Watching Cork hurling legend Christy Ring.
