00:09:25 Highpoint of playing career: winning second division championship medal in 1960.Describes also the loss of 1962 senior championship to Newtown Blues, the size of the crowd and the quality of the Newtown opposition. Mentions seeing the pen picture of Gerry O'Reilly on the first televised All- Ireland final coverage on RTE - O'Reilly was a Garda who played for Newtown Blues.
00:11:30 Refers to meeting Gerry O'Reilly at a function for old players run by the Newtown Blues.
00:12:06 Mentions other low-points: defeats in county finals of 1973 and 1976.
00:12:18 Refers to playing for Louth 'when they were stuck'.
00:12:37 Superiority of current Mattock Rangers team to that of 1960s and 70s – describes them as 'much fitter' and 'more skilful'.
00:13:25 Relationship between club and church. Reference to involvement of priests as players in 1950s and 60s and 'behind the scenes'.
00:14:15 Participation of women in club. Reflects on the absence of women in the past, the roles occupied by women in the present and aspiration that more women might become involved.
00:14:50 Openness of club to new settlers in the area and reference to the potential influence of children in smoothing the involvement of adults.
00:15:30 Economic recession and fear of youth emigration.
00:16:12 Reflection on Louth's controversial loss of 2010
