10:38 (Finbar) Discusses why the clergy were not allowed play for a club. He explains how Handball was a minority sport.

11:42 (Finbar) Recalls playing in the All-Ireland Juvenile Finals in Garryhill. Discusses the length of Handball games.

12:47 (Ray) Talks about handball in Ballymote in Sligo where he grew up. He describes the 60x30 alley in Ballymote. He mentions Keenan's from Bagenalstown.

13:35 (Ray) Talks about playing handball in Ballymote when he was growing up. He mentions Dessie Walsh, Jimmy Finn, Tony Hannon, Marcus Henry and Joey Maher.

14:57 (Ray) Describes how many people used to watch local matches on a Sunday afternoon.

15:54 (Ray) Talks about the level of support for Handball in Sligo. He mentions Ballymote and Killooney. Lists his heroes of handball.

- 17:33 (Ray) Discusses the building of the new development of the alley and how money was raised.
- 17:54 (Ray) Describes the association with the Handball alley and the local GAA club.
- 18:25 (Ray) Talks about his involvement in Handball. He tells how he won a Connaught Minor title and talks about an alley with a glass background in Roscrea in 1966.
- 19:49 (Ray) Explains how he became a Gard and played Handball in Templemore. He talks about working as a Garda in Dublin and playing Handball there. He mentions rivals such as Na Fianna and Naomh Pádraig.
- 21:11 (Ray) Talks about playing in the Handball alley the Gardaí have in the Phoenix Park and the Guinness alley in Crumlin.
- 22:03 (Finbar) He lists good Handball counties and strong Handball schools throughout the country. He mentions McCarthy from Westmeath.

- 26:12 (Finbar) Discusses the mind frame of people who play Handball. He tells a story about two juveniles playing in a minor tournament in Thurles.
- 30:20 (Finbar) Talks about how handball was played originally in the squash courts and how handball was established in Dungarvan. He talks about female involvement in Handball.
- 32:01 (Finbar) Talks about how Handball players are coached. He mentions Féile. He talks about the 40x20 alley.
- 33:51 (Finbar) Discusses the difference in playing Handball and Squash.
- 34:09 (Finbar) Talks about the changes in Handball that have been made since he was growing up. He describes the rules of Handball and the extent to which they have changed.
- 37:37 (Finbar) Discusses the difference in how people learn to play handball today compared to when he was a growing up in Kerry.
- 38:18 Finbar and Ray describe what makes a good Handball. Finbar compares Handball and Hurling.

39:45 (Ray) Discusses Handball being played in St John Castle, which was taken over by the Garda Síochana in 1987. He mentions he was a Superintendant in 1989. Finbar tells how there was an alley in the old Friary Colleges.

40:24 (Finbar) Tells how when he was growing up when someone was winning they held the alley. He mentions Ducksie Welsh.

41:09 (Finbar) Talks about the level of fitness achieved by Handball.

41:42 (Ray) Tells how the club gives annual awards to people for different achievements.

42:08 (Ray) Discusses the level of underage referees in the club and talks about the junior European World Championships in 1999 and the underage involvement in its organisation.

44:07 (Finbar) Talks about travelling to the United States to play Handball with junior teams. Talks about how the style of the game changes between the Irish and American Handball players.

45:02 (Finbar) Tells a story about two girls from England and America playing handball against two girls from the Friary, Laura Keavers and Aoife Landers, in the World Championships in Portland, Oregon in the United States.

46:26 (Finbar) Describes how America established elderly age-groups for people playing handball, such as over-80 categories.

47:04 (Finbar) Discusses the student interest in the international aspect of handball.

47:25 (Ray) Discusses the challenges facing Handball in schools. Finbar discusses this also and mentions Soccer.

48:17 (Finbar) Explains that Dungarvan had no history of handball. He mentions Kilgobnet.

48:35 Finbar and Ray talk about the development of the new alley in Dungarvan and how it was decided upon. He mentions the GAA, the County Board and the Munster council and the National Lottery.

50:57 (Ray) Describes the facilities of the new development. Tells how Finbar maintained a photographic record of the proceedings.

53:04 (Ray) Explains the negative elements of how Handball is marketed.

53:42 (Finbar) Discusses Mary McAleese meeting the players of a Handball All-Ireland.

54:20 (Finbar) Tells who built the new facilities. Talks about having to have an architect.

55:43 (Ray) Discusses an awards night that was held and the number of people who attended.

56:05 (Finbar) Talks about Abbeyside GAA club and other sports in the club. Ray discusses the County Board and the Munster Council and their dealings with them.
