They discuss the history of the GAA in the area and describe how the game of camán was played in Ardara. They talk about the development of the club and Vincent describes how the club got its ground, known as Pearse Memorial Park. They describe the make-up of the parish and note the club's main rivals in the area. Packie talks about emigrating to England before moving to America and describes his involvement in the GAA in both countries. Vincent recalls his involvement in the GAA in New York and describes the role the GAA played there. The group talk about a number of issues including the role of women in the GAA, the role that teachers and the clergy play in the Association. someone kicking the ball into the sea.
31:59 Talks about how the club got their ground. Mentions Sean Cassidy, Dan Ward, Big Paddy, Charlie and Jimmy Mooney. Highlights the sense of community in the GAA.
35:30 (John Michael) Notes how the team mates of Michael Boyle from Maghera helped him after he broke his leg.
36:00 (All) They talk about the social aspect of the GAA.
37:17 (John Michael) Discusses the impact of emigration in the 1950s and 1960s and the introduction of a school league.
39:05 (Vincent and Packie) Talks about the family aspect of the GAA.
39:54 (All) They discusses the founding of the club and the people who were involved. Talk about the lack of players available and the impact of emigration. Mentions Con Herron, John Cassidy, Con Hanna, Breslins, Mooneys, Charlie McGill, Tom Gallagher, Charlie Gallagher, the Neds (Gallaghers), Jim Connors. Discuss their championships successes. Mentions a match against St. Eunan's in Donegal Town.

44:24 They describe the make-up of the parish and the club's biggest rivals like Glenties, Killybegs and Kilcar.
47:10 They talk about the one year amalgamation with Kilcar in the 1960s.
49:00 They discuss the controversy between Dungloe and Gaoth Dobhair and having to put them in separate divisions.
51:20 The group talks about the work Columba Diver has done for the club and recalls stories about him. Being awarded Volunteer of the Year by the Ulster Council.
54:05 (John Michael) Discusses the development of the club's second pitch and the club's facilities.
55:25 (All) Talk about the fundraising they did for the club. Mention Sandfield. Running draws and lottos and getting grants. Note the work of Hugh Gerard Gavigan.
58:00 They discuss the type of fundraising done in the past. Talk about the roles of Charlie Mooney – including transporting them in his van. Recall holding a 'bizarre' in the

1970s.
59:54 (Packie) Talks about emigrating to England and then America. Playing in Birmingham with Tara's, Four Masters and John Mitchel's. Moving to America and playing in Philadelphia. Playing for the Donegal club in New York.
01:05:00 (Vincent) Discusses emigrating to England before moving to New York. Talks about Gaelic Park. Managing a team and the players who played for them. Mentions Phil Brennan a union man from Carndonagh, Paddy Ward, Mike Cassidy, Vincent Foley, Vincent Lynch, Dave McCarthy and Tom McGuinness.
01:08:20 Talks about the social side of the GAA in America. Mentions John Doohan from Falcarragh who lived in Monaghan, he married Gloria O'Boyle one of the early Mary from Dungloe's.
01:09:48 (All) They describe the celebrations in Ardara if the team wins.
01:11:39 (Vincent) Talks about the commitment of the club's players and players staying away from alcohol.
01:12:57 (All) They talk about the role of women in the club. Mention Mary Kelly (formerly Mary McHugh), Ann McGhee.
01:15:10 The group discusses the playing of ladies' football in the club. Mentions Aoife McDonnell.
01:16:20 (Vincent) Talks about the role of teachers and the clergy in the club. Discusses the role of PJ McGill / Paddy McGill.

and Anthony Molloy. Mentions Anthony Harkin, the team rainer. Winning county championships with Ardara.

01:29:09 (Packie) Describes winning the minor championship n 1952 as his favourite GAA memory.
