Interview Summary	Eamon's GAA career is a long and storied one. A native of Carlow, he was always fanatical about the GAA. Encouraged by his father he lined out for the O'Hanrahan's club. As an extremely driven player he made it on to the senior club side at an early age, going on to represent Carlow at football and hurling. Eamon came into his prime during the 1950s and competed against some of the best GAA players in the country in both codes. He suffered a temporary setback when he was diagnosed with TB but recovered after some time and resumed his playing career. Later he became a referee and got involved in politics. A dedicated GAA man and proud traditionalist, Eamon recalls his playing career with great clarity and in the process paints a picture of a society far removed from the Ireland of 2010.

05:35 Ban on other sports in force at the time. Popularity of other sports in Carlow.

06:15 Fr Cullen in Greycullen photographed at an Ireland V Wales game. Consequences of that.

07:05 Playing club matches with O'Hanrahan's against Clonmore. Crowds that watched.

07:50 Standard of football at the time compared to that played in 2010.

09:00 Admission charges for GAA games and his thoughts on that.

09:40 Problems with modern-day training methods.

10:15 Father moved to Carlow from Dublin in 1934. A Tipperary native, he brought hurling to the area. Father from Ballingarry and mother from Kilcooley.

10:50 Scholarship father won to Maynooth. How that panned out.

11:15 (Three boys and two girls in the family. Their GAA links. Sister Joan involved with Palatine. Brother Martin played with Wexford and why that was.

12:00 Father wore goggles over his glasses playing hurling. Playing on the same team as his father. Charlie Timmons playing too. Incident during a game.

13:00 Father an Irish speaker and a Republican who supported Fianna Fáil.

13:25 He and his daughter holding positions as councillors.

14:25 Administrative positions his father held. Ballinmurphy wanting a game held in Bagenalstown but opponents Tinryland wanting it to be in Dr Cullen Park. Father's attempts

to come up with a solution. Jim Kehoe a fellow administrator.

- 16:45 Their house a busy one growing up as they had a radio. People visiting all the time.
- 17:50 Hurling titles they won.
- 18:00 Good generation of footballers they had. Playing against Cork, Kerry, Kildare and Wexford.
- 18:30 Playing Kerry in the National League in Tralee. How the game went. Paddy Gardner and Mick Donovan scoring goals. What it was like going to Kerry. Staying in the Grand Hotel in Tralee.
- 19:40 Willie O'Connor in charge of that team.
- 19:50 Games against Offaly and Dublin.
- 20:15 Started playing GAA at St Joseh's school with Sr Pansy before going on to CBS school where he played in different leagues.
- 22:30 Brothers Noonan, Carroll, McInerney, Hannon, O'Connor all involved in the GAA. Instructions they gave them.
- 24:35: Recognition they got for their playing abilities.
- 25:00 Only O'Hanrahans club, started in 1919, in the town at the time. Éire Óg started in 1956. Tinryland going since 1913.
- 25:55 No underage club competitions before minor.
- 26:25 Playing with O'Hanrahan's. Style they preferred.
- 28:00 Tom Shaw and Tom Liddle training teams. What they were like.
- 28:50 Peter Reilly training them in 1958. Benefits of that.
- 29:30 Going to Carpenter's pub after a game against Clonmore. Peter Reilly saying he wanted to train Carlow. Outcome of that.
- 30:45 Playing in front of big crowds against Kerry at Dr Cullen Park. Involved in dramatic incident in the closing minutes.
- 31:40 Playing beaten All-Ireland finalists Cork.
- 31:55 Playing down in the late 1950s. How that went.
- 32:35 Getting involved with the Carlow team. Playing Waterford in 1952 with the seniors having impressed against

Wicklow with the minors.

- 33:30 First senior club game for O'Hanrahan's in Benagalstown. Charlie Doherty reporting on the game. Going in as fourth sub. How he fared.
- 37:45 Playing Leighlin in a final at 16 years old. How that went.
- 38:30 How they travelled to matches. Going to Palatine for games. Facilities there.
- 39:15 Fundraising drives the club embarked on.
- 39:55 Lots of work in Carlow in the 1950s.
- 40:25 Work he did after finishing school.
- 41:25 People from outside Carlow living in the area. Their GAA involvement.
- 42:30 Factory leagues and the standard of football. Crowds they attracted. Irish Ropes of Newbridge, Corcoran's, Thompson's all involved.
- 43:20 Playing hurling as well as football. Hurling set-up within the county. His father, Jack Monaghan, Jim Gllavey, Olie Murphy promoting the game.
- 43:45 Carlow in senior hurling league.
- 45:00 Liam Walsh and Willie Hogan top hurlers.
- 45:25 Winning a junior championship in 1960. Playing London and Cork. Run-in with a Cork player.
- 46:10 Leinster final against Leinster in New Ross. Playing Cork and Galway.
- 46:55 Sidelined due to TB in 1962. In hospital in Tullow. What that was like.
- 48:35 Returning to Gaelic games when he recovered. Getting a big score in the county final.
- 49:10 Type of player he wanted himself to be.
- 49:50 Playing against Dublin in Portlaoise in 1958. Fr Shine calling him over and having a word with him. Marking a Foley man from Dublin. How the game went.
- 51:25 Travelling to London for a hurling game in 1960. How they travelled. Where they stayed and his impressions of that. Dance held the night before the game. Timmy Moran on the

dancefloor amongst black people. Nicky Brennan and Mick Gorman there too. Going to Soho for a wander. Asking for directions at a museum. Carlow people living in London.
