Interview Summary	Members of Achill GAA Club, Thomas, Packie and Lorna discuss the role of the GAA in their lives and on Achill Island over the years. Thomas recalls football in the schools on the island and talks about the different competitions held, mainly the Scanlon Cup and the Corn Acla. They describe the state of the GAA in Achill and recall the development of the Association over the years. They discuss the introduction of Gaelic football onto the island in 1904 and how it faced competition from soccer. They talk about the link the island has with Scotland and how this led to the prominence of soccer on the island. They discuss the advantages and disadvantages of the GAA in Achill, highlighting the high travel costs of going to matches on the mainland. They talk about the impact on emigration on the island over the years and how it is again returning in modern times. Packie describes his time abroad, playing football in London and Saudi Arabia. Lorna talks about her role as secretary and the work involved. They discuss the club's participation in the Scór competition and the importance of this competition to Achill. Towards the end of the interview they describe the importance of the GAA to Achill and how the Association has a central place in the community on the island. 00:00 Introduction 00:46 (Thomas) Thomas recalls his earliest memories of the GAA. Playing in school in Ashleam. Mentions Denis Gallagher. Talks about the setting up of a schools competition

in 1949 and the Corn Acla. First year it was won by Dooagh. Playing against Corraun and having to walk to Darby's Point and then to take a boat to get there. Mentions Lug and Cloughmore. Formation of the Scanlon Cup between Mulranny, Achill Sound, Croghaun, Kildownet, St Vincent's of Mid Achill, St Joseph's and St Pat's.
03:56 Talks about how the Scanlon Cup was played in the Spring. Men came home to farm in the Spring and then went to England. Emigration from the island. Talks about the Achill club, underage, senior and ladies.
06:03 (Packie) Talks about his earliest memories. Going to a Scanlon Cup match in Keel in 1954. Local shopkeeper Needham with sweets in his van. Recalls about the pitch. The rivalry at the match. Mentions Kildownet and St. Pat's. Captaining the St Vincent's team and winning the Scanlon Cup. Celebrating after. Mentions Sean Molloy, Pat and Adrian Kilbane, Charlie Kilbane, Padraic Seoige, Denis Gallagher, Paddy McCann.
09:09 Describes how a postcard was sent out to get players to return to Achill for a match. The impact of emigration on the club. Recalls a minor county final in 1963 and losing 11 players to emigration.
10:36 Recalls moving to London and how there 25 people from Achill playing football in Gladstone Park in Cricklewood.
10:52 Discusses playing with St Vincent's in London winning two championship finals. Mentions Padraic Patten, James Kilbane and Chris McGinty.
11:20 (Thomas) Talks about how five players from Achill are now part of the GAA in Manchester. Highlights the importance of the Scanlon Cup.
12:50 Describes football in school and the Corn Acla competition and Cumann na mBunscoil.
13:46 Talks about the history of the club. First played in Curraun. Soccer was the main sport. Mentions Dooagh, Nick Lynch and the Corn Acla competition.
15:00 Discusses the establishment of the club in 1942 with Mulranny. Describes the expense of travelling to places like Ballaghaderreen, Bonniconlon, Shrule and Newport. Talks about raising money for new dressing rooms.
16:52 Talks about how they are unable to build any gates or

walls to charge people in. Describes his role in the club.

28:46 Describes the expense needed to run the club. One of the first clubs in the county to get floodlights.
29:27 Playing Dublin at the opening of the pitch. Mentions Shane MacGowan.
30:28 Talks about John Cooney, the last surviving member of the first Achill team to win the county championship, and his work for the club.
31:39 Discusses his involvement in ladies football in Achill.
32:47 Recalls a story about Michael Tommy Gallagher and

his commentating.
33:15 Talks about the importance of the Corn Acla on the island. One of the oldest underage competitions in the country.
34:03 (Lorna) Recalls her first GAA memories. Playing in the Corn Acla and watching the Scanlon Cup. Attending matches with her family.
34:50 Talks about Achill winning the county final against Islandeady in Castlebar in 2007. Going to St Jude's for the All-Ireland Sevens competition and winning it.
36:35 Describes the celebrations after the county final in 2007. Bonfires and celebrations.
36:51 (Packie) Describes how one woman had four grandsons on the team. Playing in the Gaeltacht competition.
37:47 Recalls the football pitch being known as 'Alice's Field'. Talks about the first match played in Alice's field. Club buying it. Renamed Davitt Park.
