Interview Summary	Jackie talks about his involvement in the GAA over the years. He recalls growing up in Bray and the role that the Association had in the town. He talks about his first involvement with the Bray Emmets' club and becoming juvenile secretary at the age of twelve. Jackie describes the development of the club over the years and the different administrative roles he has had. He talks about being involved with the Wicklow senior hurling team and discusses their various campaigns including the winning of two junior All-Irelands in 1967 and 1971. He discusses the history of the Bray Emmets and how the club has changed over the years. He discusses the development of his own administrative career which has seen him working at both a provincial and national level on the Leinster and Central councils. Jackie describes the place of hurling in Wicklow and highlights his hopes for the future. Towards the end of the interview Jackie discusses the importance of the GAA in his life and describes what the Association means to him.

Becoming a senior hurling selector in 1962 and the county's progress over the next number of years. Talks about winning the All-Ireland in 1967.
17:12 Recalls the winning of the All-Ireland junior hurling final in 1967. Playing in the Wembley tournament in London in 1968.Talks about Wicklow's campaigns over the next few years. Recalls beating Wexford. Talks about playing Hertfordshire three times in a final and an incident in the second match.
24:00 Recalls how Hertfordshire protested over Wicklow's Eamon Murray.
25:43 Talks about being a selector for the Wicklow team and recalls stories from that role. Discusses the 2003 All-Ireland senior 'B' final.
27:45 Talks about the different managers he worked with over the years. Recalls a story about Paddy Croke's greyhounds and rabbits.
29:43 Discusses what the training was like during that period and the teams they played against. Talks about the strong hurling clubs in Wicklow at the time.
31:28 Talks about working on the Wicklow hurling board and hurling's relationship with football. Mentions Jimmy Hatton, Sean Doyle.
33:25 Discusses what the role of selector was like. Describes

the type of support the county hurling team received.
36:30 Talks about the development of his career in administration and the people he worked with. Mentions Sean O'Farrell, Sean Doyle, Don Hyland.
