| Interview Summary | The group discuss their early memories of going to games in grounds all over Roscommon and in Dublin. They talk through their involvement in administration in Strokestown GAA – and in Martin's case, with Castlerea GAA as well – describing their responsibilities and how they raised funds for particular projects. They also talk through their playing careers, with Gerry and Martin telling stories of playing illegally while they lived in Dublin. They describe the places they played as children and the development plans they have for the club's current grounds in Farnbeg. They discuss successes that have been experienced over the years by club and county and particular players and characters that have contributed to them. They share their fears for the future, and describe how emigration has impacted their form at club level. |

13:21 Martin talks about his family's involvement. Mentions his uncle. Memories of playing football in the house. Mentions Tremane GAA. Mentions Danny Burke. Mentions Castlerea.

14:16 Tommy talks through his involvement in the GAA. Mentions being secretary, chairman and selector with the club. Mentions winning a senior championship and league in 1992.

15:18 Joanne talks through her involvement in the club. Mentions ladies' playing in Strokestown. Describes her activities as secretary.

16:41 Gerry recalls his first juvenile game. Mentions the field King's Turlough. Describes how he came to play for the senior team. Mentions Joe Fingleton.

19:20 Gerry discusses making up numbers for teams when he was younger. Mentions Hugh McCormack, John McManus. Mentions travelling by car.

- 28:28 Tommy explains how the club came to play on the Pakenham Mahon Estate. Discusses buying their own ground. Mentions fundraising.
- 29:29 The group give a brief history of the Strokestown GAA. Mentions Dr Hugh Gibbons, Jasper Tully, Jack Higgins. Mentions two old clubs, Brian Boru's and St. Patrick's natives and shop boys. Mentions Land League.
- 31:30 Gerry and Tommy tell of controversy surrounding the involvement of J Walpole in the club. Mention the Land League. Mention Rugby.
- 32:34 Gerry talks about Tom Shevlin, a cobbler, and his involvement in the club in the early years. Mentions Hayden's Hotel, now the Percy French.
- 34:38 Martin and Gerry talk through club members who were successful while playing at county level. Mentions the All-Ireland Senior Championships 1980, the All-Ireland Under 21 Championships 1978, All-Ireland Minor Championships 1939, 1941, 1951 and 2006. Mention John 'The Jigger' O'Connor, Aidan McHugh, Richard O'Beirne, Gerry O'Beirne, Cathal Beirne, Joey Campbell, Leo Duffy, Hugh Gibbons, Peter Connellan, John Joe Fallon, Niall Brogan, Eoin Donnellan, Michael Donnellan, Damien Donnellan, Luke Dolan, Colin Compton, Paddy Brogan.

played.

50:05 Martin and Tommy discuss women's involvement in Strokestown GAA over the year. Recalls Mrs Comiskey who washed the jerseys. Mentions administration, fundraising and jersey washing.

51:54 The group talk about club rivalries and their importance. Mentions Elphin and Tulsk, Kilmore, Clann na nGael, St. Brigid's and Castlerea. Mentions Croke Park and Castlebar.

53:59 Martin explains the parish rule. Also gives some notable exceptions.

54:40 Martin talks about the club's relationship with the County Board.

55:10 Gerry recalls refereeing an All-Ireland Inter Firms Semi-Final in the early 1970s. Mentions Bord na Móna. Mentions Offaly. Mentions Seamus Darby and Mícheál O'Callaghan.

56:45 Gerry talks about the difficulty of getting ex-players to become referees.

57:55 Tommy, Gerry and Martin discuss the number of people involved in the club and the difference between how it

is now and how it was when Tommy was chairman.
