He spent his early years in Galway when the GAA was temporarily weakened due to restrictions associated with World War Two. Later he moved to Roscommon and got heavily involved with the Four Roads club, his efforts eventually earning him a place on the county team. Phonsie also did much work behind the scenes, becoming very active at an administrative level. He moved from club administration to the county board to the provincial council to Central Council and Croke Park's Management Committee. One of the subcommittees he was on was a disciplinary one and he offers some insights into what that was like. Phonsie also reveals that it was he who coined the term 'Scór' as a group of them sought to give the competitions some impetus. 06:15 First impressions of playing football.

06:30 GAA when he was at school. Attending Garbally College and playing other colleges like Roscrea and De La Salle. Ban on foreign games affecting certain teams.

07:40 Attending rugby games in Lansdowne Road, Dublin.

08:30 Hurling at St. Pat's College in Dublin when he was training to become a teacher. Tipperary player Donie Nealon there. Playing in Dublin Intermediate League against teams like St Vincent's.

10:00 Involvement in provincial council, Central Council, management committee at Croke Park.

10:20 Scór involvement, nominated by Dr Keenan. Club success. Proposing the name 'scór' for the competitions. Jim Ryan wanting to change the old name.

11:40 Derry Gowan from Cork and Tony Williamson from Down initiating Scór concept as the 'Winter Competitions'. Committee formed featuring Gerry Davey, Michael Sheridan, Anne Dolan. Coming up with competition ideas. Setting it up at the beginning. Atmosphere at early competitions. Decisions questioned. Adjudicating unexpectedly at Galway County Finals in Loughrea. Reason for that. How it went. Adjudicating at an All-Ireland in Dublin.

17:45 Competing as part of a local ballad group. Instrument they used. County final in Boyle. Going to Connacht final in Roscommon. Big crowds.

21:05 Winning a junior championship in 1966.

21:40 Football club, St Aidan's, an amalgamation of Ballyforan and Kevin Barry's.

22:20 Hurling at Four Roads. Maith Go Leor's a team in the past. Hurling at Four Rods declining before Johnny Mee revived it again. Roscommon footballer Gerry O'Malley in a championship winning team in the 1940s. Success since the 1950s. His son Adrian winning many championships and eventually managing teams.

23:40 Football in the parish and in Dysart.

25:15 Differences between GAA in Roscommon and Galway. Travelling to games in Galway. How they went. 1942 county final between Liam Mellows and Ardrahan. Ardrahan objecting to the match being played. Replay in Loughrea. Huge arguments. Repercussions.

27:30 Other means of travelling to games.

28:00 Travelling to Four Roads games. Colours the team wore.

29:40 Role of teachers in the GAA when he was young. Matt Heavey an involved teacher, as was Sonny Kenny. Returning to the area to teach. Mentions Jim McMahon.

30:45 Standard of hurling at St Pat's. Paying against college from Dalgan. How they travelled. Going to a dance on the way back from a match.

32:55 Brother joining the priesthood and going to college in Carlow. GAA in Carlow.

33:50 1953 county final with Four Roads.

34:30 Being selected for the county team. How he fared with that side. Success they had. Playing Leitrim in Mohill. Mysterious man arriving on a motorbike.

36:05 Playing for the first time with the county in Birr against Offaly. How that went. County training at the time. Reaction at home when he was selected.

37:50 Playing for Roscommon minors and drawing with Galway at St. Coman's Park. Replay in Ballinasloe. Father attending.

38:35 Son Adrian getting to play in Croke Park.

39:10 Playing in Charlestown, Carrick-On-Shannon, Tuam with the minors. Playing a final in Tuam and cheering for

Galway in a game that followed his one.

40:00 Celebrations in the area when the club did well. What players drank.

40:45 Peadar Earley from Gorthaganny ringing him about a vacancy on the Connacht Council. Being vice-chairman of the county board and later county chairman. Central Council and Management Committee. Positions filled at club level.

43:45 Ownership of club grounds. Fundraisers.

45:55 Switch from club to county administration.

46:20 Putting hurleys in every club in Roscommon. Conditions of use. Seven hurling clubs in Roscommon. Why hurling is a struggle in Roscommon.

48:05 Coiste Iomana work. Roscommon winning Under-16 and minor All-Irelands in 1969. Beating Kildare both times, the Under-16 game in Mullingar and the minor one at Parnell Park on the morning of the senior final. Getting All-Ireland tickets from GAA President Seán Ó Síocháin.

50:10 His style as a trainer/selector.

51:00 Matt Heavey a good hurler. Gerry O'Malley, Paddy Dolan, Benny Tansey, Frank Carthy, Brian Mitchell playing with Connacht in Railway Cup. Benny Connaughton, Michael Finneran, Br Dwyer, Br Maher, Ollie Hanley good club players.

52:00 Four Roads winning a Connacht club championship.

52:55 Missing a big game in Ballyforan because of a league game. Man going to game in Ballyforan and to a pub in Abbeyknockmoy in Galway afterwards. Players returning from game in Ballyforan and complaining.

53:45 Support for Four Roads team. Game in Wexford Park after winning provincial title.

54:40 Big decisions at county board level. Struggling for finances. Looking for sponsorship. Fundraising.

56:35 Administrative structures in Roscommon. Divisional boards and how they evolved. Hurling fixtures haphazard. Finding solutions.

59:50 Hurling failing to progress on a national level. Reason some counties are stronger than others.

01:01:40 Four Roads football players' interest in how the

hurlers were faring.

01:02:30 Involvement with the county team when he was county board chairman. Duties he had to fulfil.

01:04:35 County grounds in Roscommon. Need for redevelopment. History of Hyde Park. What it cost to buy.

01:06:05 Ladies football in the county. Camogie club in Four Roads and their success. Final against Corofin of Clare.

01:07:00 Son, Gerard, involved in Leinster Council and living in Kildare.
