	dominant teams in Leinster and the country at large. The influence of family and local clergy elicits comment as does
	the role of School Leagues. Woods charts the story of his
	playing days with Cooley and offers perspectives on issues
	such as the changing role of women in the club, the place of
	the club in the community and wider developments within the
	GAA, including the relaxation of the bans on foreign games
	and the playing of rival sports in Croke Park.

Was selected for the Louth minors because they came to Gormanstown to play against the college.</li> <li>00:03:30 First memory of playing for Cooley was with the second division team after he left school c. 1958</li> <li>00:03:48 Discusses the GAA heroes of his youth: Stephen White, Jack Regan, Sean Boyle, Jack Bell.</li> <li>00:04:15 Remarks on the 'all absorbing' nature of his involvement with Cooley Kickhams when he was playing. Recalls marking Kevin Beahan in a game against Ardee in 1960. That Cooley team included players from the St. Michael's College.</li> <li>00:05:30 Discusses the decline of Cooley after the loss of St. Michael's players and the decision to re-grade back to junior status c. 1962. Fortunes improved again and club returned to senior in 1964.</li> </ul>
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00:06:15 The place of the GAA in community life and its development over 20 years. Reference is made to the shift in focus from the church to the club.
00:07:10 Reference to levels of activity in club, including women's football, and pressure on pitches.
00:07:45 Discussion on the changing role of women within the club and past perceptions of women's involvement in sport. Reference is also made to the place of women in the administration of the club.
00:08:30 The importance of voluntarism and criticism of the alleged payment of managers. Says clubs should look to themselves and speculates on the possible impact of the recession in this regard.
00:09:20 Discusses the influence of the clergy on the Cooley club.
00:09:40 Mentions Dublin and Meath as Louth's main rivals.
00:09:50 Selects as a personal GAA highlight the captaining of the Cooley team in 1964 and the start of the club's renaissance. Discusses club's subsequent fortunes.
00:10:55 Discusses the influence of media and television in

	bringing games to a wider audience. Speaks of changing
	nature of sporting allegiances.
	00:11:40 Discusses the significance of removing the ban on foreign games and opening up of Croke Park.
	00:12:30 Comments on growth in public interest in the Irish language and his involvement in social groups that meet to converse in Irish. Contrasts this willing engagement with the language with the compulsory methods of old.
