His career was short and he didn't play to the highest standards, but he maintained his involvement with the GAA through his work on local radio, where he hosted a sports programme. He talks about the great Cavan teams of the past and of his admiration for them - and recalls writing a song about legendary captain Charlie Gallagher, which was recorded by different musicians.
