Interview Summary	Peter Murphy discusses his early introduction to the GAA, travelling to local games on his father's bicycle and eventually playing in school. His details his subsequent emigration to London, his return to Ireland and his reintroduction to club life. Serving as club chairman for a decade from 1999 onwards, he charts the highs and lows of club performance and outlines the challenges that faced the club in developing facilities and encouraging youth participation. Murphy also discusses past players admires and changes that he would like to see in how Gaelic football is played.

	00:00:33 Earliest memories: the establishment of first team in 1952/3. Recalls living 2 miles outside village over the border in Co Meath and travelling with his father to home matches on a bicycle.
	00:01:27 Football in school. Started playing under 14 at 11 years of age, competed in schools league.
	00:01:45 Playing underage football for a period with Glen Rovers in Tullyallen under the management of Larry McGraine.
	00:02:05 Winning O'Duffy cup medal in 1961.
	00:02:16 Emigration in mid 1960s. Moved to London – life in London and lack of serious involvement. Difference between GAA at home and in London.
	00:03:16 Return to Ireland and occasional participation as

player. Work commitments, travel and lack of time for training.
00:03:45 Beginnings of involvement at administrative level and as a team selector.
00:03:55 Danger of being relegated to Junior football in 1994 and fears for future of club.
00:04:10 Privilege of being associated with Damien Reid and Reid's contribution to club and county.
00:05:00 Chairman of club in 1999, remaining for a decade. Highlights of tenure, including the winning of first senior championship in 2002 and playing in a Leinster club final. Reference to quality of committee around him.
00:06:40 Winning senior championship in 2005 and Leinster club championship performance. Memory of the late Dermot Earley.
00:07:19 Performance of club post-2005, championship inals.
00:07:50 Mentions favourite Louth players of the past.
00:08:20 Admiration for Seán Purcell, Mattie McDonagh and Jack Mannion from Galway and Mick O'Connell and Jack O'Shea from Kerry.
