10:30 Few clubs had their own pitches at the time.

10:35 Having a wooden pavillon and socialising there often over the years.

11:35 Cutting the grass in the area during the summer and playing tennis.

11:35 Cycling to Portmarnock for a swim and then getting chips in Coolock.

12:00 Getting to know the people in Coolock. Dublin a small place at the time.

12:55 Going window shopping as a young woman and seeing couples coming from the Theatre Royal.

14:05 Cycling to training after work.

14:40 Man collecting slop for the pigs and wishing them luck for upcoming games. Other locals supporting them.

16:00 Mr Price and Seán O'Neill running Na Droigheadóirí team. Training done at school and playing games with the club. Many Price, Duffy and Phelan children playing on the team.

17:10 Success they had. Reason for break-up of club.

- 17:50 Ailish Keegan running Celtic club with Nell McCarthy.
- 18:30 First training session with Celtic. Playing in goal.
- 19:30 Where their players came from.
- 20:20 Awareness of inter-county players at the time.
- 20:35 Father bringing them to games in Croke Park to watch games.
- 21:00 Woman she knew who went to Croke Park every Sunday and often hit those criticising the referee with her umbrella. Strong reaction of one particular man to being hit.
- 22:40 Pitch they had in national school. Using the Phoenix Park when they were in secondary school.
- 23:15 What she thought of Phoenix Park pitches.
- 24:20 Making friends through her involvement.
- 25:30 Getting engaged. Terry O'Sullivan going to social occasions and writing on them. Terry visiting the pavillon in Coolock when she returned from her honeymoon.
- 26:30 Having her hen party in Coolock. Terry O'Sullivan calling out and writing about it.
- 27:35 Their pitch near a Cadbury's factory. Protestant church nearby.
- 28:25 Five teams in the club at the time. Emphasis on youth.
- 29:00 Monthly meetings with captains and vice-captains on how to improve things at the club.
- 29:50 Impact of losing their pitch.
- 30:30 Playing in St Anne's after they lost their pitch.
- 30:55 Camogie losing out as Dublin people had more disposable income to do things with in their spare time.
- 31:30 Male coaches instructing them in a way which she thought was unsuitable.
- 31:50 Nell advising them to play the game a certain way.

- 33:20 Enjoying the game when it was 12-a-side.
- 34:04 Men coaching at mixed schools and how that was reflected in their style of play.
- 34:55 Antrim and Dublin playing a similar style of camogie.
- 35:10 Travelling to Belfast by taxi to play a game in the 1950s. Being stopped at the border by soldiers with guns. Problem with one of the taxis and how they overcame that. How she felt about the incident.
