	2:12 Grandfather, Mick Dalton, trained the Kilkenny team for thirty four years – a hairdresser by trade – had shop in Watergate – a noted handballer – won six senior all-Ireland medals
	2:57 Strong handballing tradition in Kilkenny – Talbot's Inch club very famous – many champions
	3:21 Life in the hairdressers – famous hurlers from the generation would meet there.
	3:56 Mick Dalton became the trainer of the Kilkenny team in 1917 – stories he heard about the time he went with the Kilkenny team to America in 1934 – organisation of the trip – stories about the meals on the boat – German ship- banquet after the first days hurling- he trained them and looked after any injuries – training very different then – players paying for themselves to get to matches.
