Interview Summary	Members of Ballingarry GAA Club discuss their involvement with the GAA and their passion for hurling and football. They explain how the location of Ballingarry close to the Kilkenny border has affected the club, and they outline the history of the club. They consider how the GAA has acted as a unifying force in their locality, and across the nation, in the wake of the civil war. They also describe their earliest memories of attending matches and the involvement of various family members in the organisation. In addition, they mention several individuals who have significantly influenced their club, for example Dan O'Connor and Monsignor Peter O'Sullivan. They explain how they formation of a rugby club in Ballingarry in 1970 was a factor in the GAA club's opposition to the lifting of the ban on foreign games and dances, and they consider how the lifting of the ban and the opening of Croke Park has impacted on the organisation.

15:09 Mention of 1848 rebellion of Young Irelanders locally. Battle at the Widow McCormack's house. Miners with experience in explosives. Mentions Smith O'Brien, Mr Cullen.
16:51 Discussion about local activity during War of Independence and Civil War. IRA and Black and Tans. Divisiveness of civil war. Role of GAA clubs in unifying parish after civil war.
20:19 Dick describes his father's role in the Irish Guards in the British Army, fighting in France, playing with Ballingarry with Willie Corcoran in 1925. His father's involvement as trainer and selector with 1950s teams.
21:37 Paddy describes his role of masseuse with Holycross and Tipperary teams of the 50s. Mentions James Murray, Dick Blake, Mick Laffin, Tom Lahart Mentions Pat Stakelum and John Doyle. Learning massage at Ballincurry Athletic Club. Mentions John Barry, Patsy Pitts, John Bowe, Noel Gaynor. Overlap between athletes and GAA players. Mentions John Joe Barry of the 1940s, The Ballincurry Hare, World Champion athlete, first scholarship to Villanova. Mentions

Eamon Coughlan. Recollections of Barry's skill. Also mentions Roger Bannister.
26:33 Paddy's massaging technique. Rubbing wintergreen and olive oil into athletes, mixed with poitín. Loosening up muscles. Common injuries. Players running barefoot. In 1950s. Recollections of injuries incurred running cross- country. Dick winning junior All-Ireland medal, hospitalised for frostbite.
29:28 Paddy discusses different injuries. No hamstring injuries then. Mentions Nicky Byrne. Risks of trying to get fit quickly today.
30:48 Recollection of playing match in 1937 minor hurling team. Description of gear brought on bicycle carrier. Paddy recalls living in the convent in 1941, being carried on bar of Jimmy St. John's bike.
32:52 Dick describes attending 1939 All-Ireland Senior Hurling Final. Borrowing his sister's bike to cycle to Kilkenny, his father cycling on Dick's bike. Train to Dublin. Describes thunder and lightning at match. Cork vs. Kilkenny. War breaking out that day. Remembers seeing headling in <i>The</i> <i>Irish Press,</i> "War Breaks Out."
34:53 Description of war years. Scarcity of white bread, tea, sugar. Rationing. Shortage of cigarettes, petrol. Impact of war and foot and mouth on match fixtures. Recollection of being driven in creamery lorry to match, driver couldn't drive into Clonmel, walking to Clonmel to tog out. Camaraderie on lorry.
37:00 Discussion of Ballingarry's rivals in the 40s and 50s: Killenaule, Mullinahone, St. Pats. In mid-division in 1952. Reasons for move. Moving back to South the year after.
38:28 Description of influential individuals in the club in 1940s. Mentions Paddy Dalton secretary, Willie Brennan, Jack Vaughan. Training in The Carhouse. Push-ups. Running. Playing hurling and football. Dick playing for Tipperary, junior football and hurling. Recollection of matches in the 40s. Playing junior hurling and football the same day in Listowel. Players crowded into car. Mentions hackney man Keely from Callan. No collective training with county team.
43:16 Discussion about divisions in Tipperary: 4 divisions. South and West traditionally football divisions, changes. North and Mid traditionally hurling.
44:14 Club's relationship with county board. In early 1900s, secretary of county board from Ballingarry, Martin Brennan.

Tipperary winning 4 senior football titles. Mentions on 1900 Tipperary team Mick Aylward. Also mentions Mick's son Jim. Also mentions Tommy Barrett county secretary. Also mentions Frank Murphy of Cork. Also mentions Mick Barrett, athlete. Also Lanigan family involved in athletics.
47:48 Discussion about Dan O'Connor's influence on the GAA. Administrator and trainer of juvenile section of club in 50s and 60s. Involvement in hurling. Close to winning two minor titles in 60s. Winning first minor county title in 1994. Mentions Ballingarry and Slieveardagh, among other schools involved in GAA. Secondary schools: Presentation College. Contribution of schools toward fostering Gaelic games.
50:05 Camogie teams, strength of camogie team in 1960s. Mentions Ann Carroll. Strong tradition of handball. Ball alley in The Commons. Mentions Bowler?? Healy from 1920s to 1950s. New alley built in 1960s. Mentions Delaneys of Kilkenny, Paddy Downey, John Ryan. Betting on handball, alcove in wall of old handball alley for wager.
53:24 Discussion about tournaments in Ballincurry. Teams from Bennettsbridge, Graigue, Oulart, Moycarkey, Sarsfields, Killenaule. Final coinciding with Munster final in Thurles. Mid- 50s to 60s. Challenging to referee matches. Prizes: suit- lengths and gold watches. Mentions Wexford's Podge Kehoe, the Rackards. Sports day with athletic events, matches in evening. Fundraiser for athletics club. Teams invited to tournament.
56:47 Dick recounts story about refereeing matches at tournaments. Mentions Boherlahan.
58:28 Discussion about parish location near Kilkenny border. Near Graigue and Tullaroan. Intense intercounty rivalry.
59:35 Dances held in Ballingarry, fundraisers for club. McGraths' Hall. Céilís, foxtrots, waltzes. Crowds at dances. Mentions Jim Aylward. Lemonade for sale. Fights at dances among drunk men. Platform dances in new handball alley in 60s and 70s. McGraths' hall owned by local family. Parish hall built in 70s.
01:03:03 Outline of development of club. Martin discusses purchase of land in mid to late 90s. Dressing rooms built in 2000. Village-based club, good location. Fundraising efforts: local club lotto, golf classic. Priority to pay off club debt. Dick's previous role of treasurer in simpler times: he mentions church gate collections.

01:06:17 Martin reflects on his earliest hurling memories: club games at The Steeple in the 50s. Attending Munster final in 1960 with his father, Cork vs. Tipperary. Mentions Christy Ring, Paddy Barry. His efforts to see the match, mentions Dick Maher. Semple Stadium. Mentions Tom Ryan of Killenaule.
01:09:05 Martin's son the first from South Tipperary to captain winning minor team. Mentions other south Tipperary players: Tommy Brennan, Nicholas Loughlin, Michael Ivors, Liam Cahill, Nigel Cleere, Adrian Cleere, Trevor Ivors, Philip Ivors, Tommy McGrath, James Logue, Georgie Hayes. Nicholas Loughlin moving to England. Martin's family connection to 1920s player John Joe Callanan. Team travelling to America. His daughter marrying Tipperary captain Eoin Kelly.
01:11:45 They reflect on the positive impact on club of local players playing at county level. Dick recalls making hurleys. Describes the ash trees he'd seek out, technique. Mentions hurley makers Jimmy Ryan of Killenaule, Jim O'Brien of Drangan, Don Lyons, Eamon Cahill, Joe Duggan. Martin recalls his first hurley. Comparison of longevity of hurleys in the past with throwaway culture today.
