| Interview Summary             | Liam recalls growing up in Cork and the role that the GAA<br>played in his life. He mentions his family's involvement in the<br>GAA. He describes listening to matches on the radio growing<br>up, and playing hurling during his school days. Liam mentions<br>the economic situation of the 1940s and 50s that meant some<br>aunts and uncles had to emigrate. He describes the social<br>gatherings that ensued whenever they returned to visit<br>Ireland. He discusses his transfer to the Ardmore club in<br>Waterford, his administrative roles with the club and the<br>struggles of bringing the game of hurling to a predominantly<br>football area. He also discusses the role of Scór in the GAA.<br>Liam articulates how he sees the GAA as an expression of<br>Irish culture and identity, emphasising the importance of a<br>sense of place. He speaks of some of the changes that he<br>has seen in the Association over his lifetime, and mentions<br>the importance of volunteerism in the GAA. Liam recalls his<br>happiest memories of the GAA, and also mentions some<br>areas where he feels improvement is needed. He concludes<br>by stating what the GAA means to him. |

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| 04:48 Recounts his school days. Mentions Clann Chríost<br>National School, Gortroe. Mentions teacher, Eoin<br>Bermingham. Recalls playing hurling in school without<br>hurleys, emulating Tony Doran and Michael "Babs" Keating.<br>Mentions Kilkenny. Recalls buying a "hurling ball" with his<br>confirmation money. Mentions economic circumstances of the<br>time. |
| 06:22 Discusses interests he had other than Gaelic games,<br>such as dancing. Mentions Red Barn and the acts that played<br>there, such as The Dixielanders, Brendan Bowyer, Maurice<br>Mulcahy, Mick Delahunty, Clipper Carlton, Johnny Butler.   |
| 07:03 Recalls growing up in an era of "American Wakes"<br>when uncles and aunts emigrated to America. Describes what<br>would happen at the "wakes". Mentions England and<br>America.  |
| 08:32 Discusses his playing career. Explains what he got out of his playing days. Surmises what the GAA brings to people's lives.  |
| 09:46 Explains what role the GAA played in his life. Mentions point-to-points.   |
| 10:22 Recalls travelling to matches in his younger days.<br>Mentions cycling to matches, getting lifts in cars. Mentions his<br>uncle Paddy Cooney and Castlemartyr; also Ted Sullivan,<br>Liam Dowling, Dominic Barry, the Abernethys. Recalls how<br>hurling was his only love.  |

| Championship win, as well as Dick Ducey from Toureen.<br>Mentions Toureen beating Mount Sion in 1950 County Final,<br>in which Pat Fanning and former Waterford captain and<br>trainer John Keane played. Mentions Gortore and Killagh,and<br>how he befriended Dick Ducey. Reveals new coaching<br>concepts introduced by Dick Ducey. Mentions Midleton.   |
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| 17:49 Recalls reaction to hurling being introduced to<br>Ardmore. Explains demographics of Waterford re Gaelic<br>football and hurling. Mentions Christy Ring and his quote -<br>"football is only for people who can't play hurling". Mentions<br>Tyrone and Kerry. Mentions the "charisma" of Waterford<br>huling and their style of play. Mentions the years 1957, 1959,<br>1963. Mentions Justin McCarthy, David Fitzgerald. Mentions<br>2002 and 2004. |
| 20:54 Discusses the challenges that hurling faces in West<br>Waterford. Emphasises the role that schools play in Gaelic<br>games. Mentions other sports – soccer and rugby. Speaks of<br>sports competing for the hearts and minds of young players.  |
| 22:45 Recalls how he transferred to Ardmore. Mentions role<br>he undertook, and how the club financed the purchase of its<br>own field. Mentions Paddy Buggy officiating at its opening in<br>1984.   |
| 24:00 Details his administrative roles with Ardmore. Mentions<br>Scór, strong in the area, including Dungarvan. Mentions Scór<br>county final in the Lakelands, Galway in 1975. Recalls two<br>busloads of supporters attending from Ardmore. Mentions<br>Derry Gowen, instigator of Scór.  |
| 26:45 Describes what he feels Scór brings to a GAA club.<br>Explains the contribution it has made to the preservation of<br>Irish culture. Assesses where Scór comes in the hierarchy of<br>a GAA club. Discusses how it has attracted females to<br>become involved in the GAA.  |
| 29:59 Details his own specific interest in Scór, mentioning<br>recitations. Mentions John Duggan, songwriter who wrote<br>songs for Foster and Allen as well as Brendan Shine.<br>Mentions song "The Greatest Game" regarding football.<br>Describes collaborating with John Duggan on monologues.  |
| 31:35 Describes how he sees the GAA as an expression of<br>Irish identity and culture. Describes how reminiscing is a<br>pastime of his. Mentions Ring and Mackey. Mentions culture<br>of success with Kilkenny, Tipperary and Cork. Mentions<br>players such as Jimmy Smyth, Joe Sammon of Galway,<br>Gerry O'Malley of Roscommon, Sean Purcell of Galway,   |
